#### **INCH HOUSE**

In common with all other community centres across the city, Edinburgh Council closed Inch House in March 2020. The house currently remains closed to the public and also to the numerous user groups who had used the House regularly for many years prior to the covid pandemic. Fortunately, from last September, the Liberton After School Club (LASC) was permitted by Edinburgh Council to make use of the ground floor on weekday afternoons, and this arrangement has continued successfully since then, following strict Council guidance and protocols and with support from the

ICA House keyholder and Edinburgh Council facilities management staff.

ICA Trustees are currently working with Edinburgh Council community centre management staff to facilitate the reopening of Inch House as soon as possible, while ensuring strict compliance with applicable Scottish Government and Edinburgh Council guidance. It is hoped that a phased opening of the House to user groups and the wider Inch community can be rolled out later in the summer months. #### **'SAVE INCH PARK' CAMPAIGN**

As you may know Inch Park is directly threatened by Edinburgh Council's City Plan 2030 proposals to build housing for up to 2000 people in Inch Park Plant Nursery, smack in the centre of the Park. Moreover, the Council has made no attempt to share its plans for the Nursery development with the local Inch Community.

Such a development would destroy the unique character of Inch Park for ever. Instead of trees, there would be a view of concrete, and instead of people, there would be hundreds of extra cars criss-crossing Inch Park daily as the new residents inevitably use the existing road through the park as a 'rat run'. This cannot be allowed to happen.

Inch Community Association has collected over 4000 signatures through an internet petition as part of its campaign to stop the development and has passed them onto the Council. We have called on the Council's Planning Committee to reject this terrible proposal when it meets on 11th August. We will keep you posted.

## **BALSAM BASH**

As Inch residents know, Inch Park is particularly beautiful at this time of year, as the trees bud and blossom and the long evenings arrive. To keep our park looking great, the Association has commenced an early summer campaign to tackle and remove the invasive Himalayan Balsam species from along the banks of the Braid Burn within lower Inch Park This plant, which grows in vast numbers along the Braid Burn, is a disaster for local nature. Few insects in this country can eat it, it smothers out native Scottish plants and causes serious erosion of riverbanks, which can lead to flooding.
